## CALIFORNIA STEWARD SPEAKS WITH RTIP STUDENTS



**Tucson, AZ** — Scott Chaney, a steward presently working in Southern California, took some time to talk with students about the “nuts and bolts” about what stewards do. In the Hirsch class he went through one of his normal days from beginning to end. Hearings, scratches, and meetings in the morning, to watching the races and enforcing rules later during the live racing were all a part of a day in the life of a steward.

In the Advanced Racing Law class, he talked more in depth about rules and how stewards applied them in different scenarios. After listening to his lecture, students watched different races with interferences and assumed the role of the steward to decide what should happen in

each race. Students were able to apply the rules and regulations that they have been learning about into a real life scenario.
